When you take your child to the doctor's <u>office for a physical</u>, please make sure you ask for any paperwork to <u>be filled out at the time of your visit</u>. Many pediatricians' offices will charge you a fee to complete/process paperwork if you ask after the time of your visit!

All required health forms for the 2018-19 school year will be mailed

***New for 2018-19 school year-- Per New York State law, all 5th and 7th grade students will be required to submit a physical form. Please contact your child's health care provider to make sure that there is a current physical on file so that it can be submitted to the Health Office in September 2018.

Attitude is Everything at Hoover Middle School! If your child is interested in playing sports for Hoover Middle School, or playing up to a high school sport at either Kenmore West or Kenmore East, please have him/her see the nurse about his/her physical. You can also check the Kenmore Town of Tonawanda district website, under Athletic Department, for further information about sports and any forms that your child may need completed in order to play.

Please note that **all medications**, whether for emergency purposes (i.e. Epi -pen, Glucagon, Benadryl, inhaler), as well as any over-the-counter medications for pain, cough, and cold/allergy symptoms **require a note from your child's health care provider.** Students **should not be carrying** these medications on them without medical documentation, and are in direct violation of school district policy.



In the beginning of June, letters will be sent out to families, asking that a parent/guardian come to the school by **June 20th, 2018 (last day of school)** to pick up their child's medication. Any medication not picked up by that day will be disposed of in accordance with both the New York State Department of Education and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation guidelines. Medications <u>are not allowed</u> to be kept for the following school year. Please make arrangements with the health office to pick up any unused medication for your child.

Together We Create, Present, Respond and Connect

Students have been busy drawing painting, sculpting and making computer art hoping to have their work displayed in the hallways of Hoover for the evening of the Spring Concert, Wednesday, May 23rd.

Projects include 7th grade pastel drawings of Japanese Koi fish, 6th grade imaginary landscapes drawn in extreme detail and 5th grade watercolor paintings of hot air balloons. Check out the hallways of Hoover and find watercolors of lily pads inspired by Monet, hearts and flowers by Mrs. Coley's students, colorful coiled clay vessels and symmetrical paintings of imaginary insects.

Besides producing beautiful works of art, students also learn about the lives of famous artists and see reproductions of their masterpieces, to help in understanding that how the art of the past can inspire to create art of the present. Students also critique the art of the masters and of their peers, debating and discussing what makes an artwork good. When students perceive, they can achieve! Art making at HMS also involves higher level thinking skills such as compare and contrast, analysis, decision making, composing, and creating.

Accelerated Art is a new program in the Kenmore-Tonawanda schools, which allows students to take 8th grade art as well as a Studio in Art class, doubling their first high school year art experience. Grade 5 News

Continuing with the theme of important figures in America, the students will begin with a brief study of the importance of sports in American culture over time. The heart of this module is a whole class study of the short biography, *Promises to Keep: How Jackie Robinson Changed America*. Students will analyze Jackie Robinson as a specific example of an athlete who served as a leader who broke barriers in society. They will build their writing skills by crafting clear opinions and providing sufficient reasons and evidence.

In Social Studies, we are comparing and contrasting Mexico, Canada, and the United States governments.

In Math, we will begin Module 6 which focuses on data distribution using plots and histograms on graph paper.

In Science, we will end the year focusing on systems on space and earth's systems. Mrs. Cummins, Mrs. Stoerr, and Miss Todaro would like to congratulate all the students that participated in the Living Wax Museum. Mrs. Hall, Mr. Marcinelli, and Mrs. Anzalone had fun using the new Chromebooks. The students will be working on a computer project in May using the new Chromebooks. The students will be demonstrating how to solve math problems with a partner.

Grade 6 Team BPR



Team BPR (Butler, Pilato, Roberts) has been eager to see more signs of spring. Instead, we have all seen too much of the white stuff during the month of April. To distract ourselves (as we *patiently* wait for the milder,

sunnier weather) we have been working diligently so that our last quarter of 6th grade is a positive, sunny one.

In ELA classes we have been developing our argumentative writing skills by selecting the best evidence (details/quotes) to support a claim (answer or opinion statement). We have also collaboratively researched a topic of our choosing from The Great Depression Era and created a Google slideshow to share those facts with our peers. We are reading <u>Bud</u>, <u>Not Buddy</u> by Christopher Paul Curtis and are enjoying the main character, Bud, as he faces many challenges with eyes wide open and a heart full of hope. We are also collecting items, or money, to assist other students who are in foster care through a program called Care Cases.

In Math classes we have been studying concepts of geometry. We are building on 4th and 5th grade concepts of area and volume. Students are using fractional side lengths to determine volumes of rectangular prisms and learning how to "work backwards" when volumes are known, but side lengths are missing.


With the NYS Math Assessments coming up in early May, we have also been conducting comprehensive reviews of concepts learned starting last September. Looking ahead, we will be taking a look at the surface areas of three -dimensional objects and concluding the year with a study of data analysis and statistics.

In Social Studies classes, we just finished a unit on the Israelites. We discussed the importance of the Torah in the Jewish religion. We talked about monotheism (belief in one god) and polytheism (belief in many gods) and how each religion is unique and special to those who practice it. In our next unit, we will be learning about the Ancient Greeks. Among other things, we'll compare and contrast Athenian Democracy with American Democracy. We will compare the city-states of Athens and Sparta. We will delve into some of the cool myths and traditional stories about Greek gods and heroes. We'll finish up the unit talking about Greek philosophers and Alexander the Great. We'll finish up the year talking about Ancient Rome.

In Science classes, we are in the middle of a unit on Sound Waves and Hearing. Soon we will be comparing sound and light and figuring out how light is different from sound. Our next unit will be Force and Motion. We will discuss potential and kinetic energy. We will also analyze how distance, time and speed are related. We will wrap up the year talking about Electricity and Magnetism.

We are looking forward to a fabulous 4th quarter and a very successful and fun end of the school year! (-:





Team 7-1 Update

It has been a busy spring for Team 7-1!

SOCIAL STUDIES: In Mrs. Halt's class, the students are currently finishing a unit on Jacksonian Democracy. We are excited to start our next unit on Social Reform. We will look at problems facing the United States today and focus on the reform movements of the early 1800s. Topics will include: women's rights, temperance, and the abolition of slavery. Recently, students completed writing their second Enduring Issue essay. They worked very hard to analyze documents and connect a variety of historical events that focused on the issue of conflict.

MATH: Mrs. Yemma's Math 7 students are finishing up the unit on percent's. Accelerated Math students are in the middle of studying angle relationships. The students have been doing a great job of completing their weekly reviews, getting them checked throughout the week, and earning high scores as a result!

ELA: Mr. Kleismit's classes have started their third and final novel, *Fever 1793.* Students are still reading their own independent novels and occasionally listening to a read-aloud of *A Monster Calls in class.* Permission slips for the *A Monster Calls* movie will be coming home soon. The seventh grade also received some exciting news from Water for South Sudan. After completing the Iron Giraffe Challenge in November and raising almost \$1,900 for the charity, Hoover won a drawing for a Skype call with Salva Dut! Salva is one of the main characters in *A Long Walk to Water*, the first book we read this year. Two students from each seventh-grade team will get a chance to ask Salva questions during the Skype call, and the whole grade will be in the audience for the conversation! It's wonderful to have the students' hard work recognized in this way!

SCIENCE: In Mr. Spengler's class, the students just finished the unit on Rocks and Minerals. They performed well on a four day Rock and Mineral Identification Lab as a culmination of this section. We are starting Plate Tectonics and Geologic History. This is our last unit of the year. The students will be doing their last Vernier Probeware to investigate convection and conduction currents of the Mantle and Atmosphere. We will be starting our review for the Performance Exam at the end of May and the Written Exam after that. Our students Lab Performance is scheduled for June, 6th, 2018 in class. There will be in-class, on-line, and after school reviews. I will be sending home a letter explaining the reviews with your child. Team 7-1 is working hard, racing toward summer!

Career Cruising

Seventh grade students recently used the Career Cruising Program to complete an interactive online career interest inventory during their FACS classes. Using the Career Matchmaker & My Skills assessments, students identified two career areas related to their personal interests & skill sets and then further researched these areas to learn about job responsibilities, work conditions, required education, and salary. Career Matchmaker includes real-life interviews so students can learn firsthand what a typical day is like for professionals in these career areas. Mrs. Vittum explained to the students that it is helpful to identify areas of interest before transitioning to high school so students can align their high school courses with their career or vocational interests to help them better prepare for their futures.
